We have visited two operas and a Johann Strauss Gala and plan regular outings to local theatres sharing cars for transport.

TECHNICAL TOPICS

15th

ASTRONOMY (Graeme Nash) Starts 23Fd September

Ferndown Youth Centre, Mondays from 2.00 - 4.00.

This one-year course deals with all aspects of astronomy. Topics considered include some basics of the earth's place in the universe, the history of astronomy to 1900, instruments and observing techniques, the solar system, the sun, the stars, galaxies and cosmology, including the origin of the universe. Weather permitting, observations of the sun (using safe filters) and Venus are made. The presentation is informal with use made of view graphs, slides, models and astronomical equipment. No previous knowledge of astronomy is assumed. Active participation by course members is encouraged and extra topics suggested by them are warmly welcomed

CAMERA WORKSHOP (Ann Williams)

Ferndown Youth Centre, Thursday 1.30-2.45 fortnightly 1st and 3sd in the month. This is a new workshop in which people who enjoy photography of all kinds can help and encourage each other to increase that enjoyment. Some meetings will be on location and others will be at the centre to look at pictures in a creative way. Everyone is welcome despite how much or how little experience they have and whatever their type of camera. Input from members will be welcomed.

HISTORY OF SPACE EXPLORATION 1957 - 2002 (Brian Ford)

Ferndown Youth Centre, Wednesdays 9,30-10.45.

The tutor of this course has been interested in astronomy and space flight since 1954 and he would like to share his interest in this fascinating subject. The course is an overview of unmanned and human space flight from Sputnik 1 to the International Space Station. No previous knowledge of astronomy or other sciences is necessary. The course will be a mixture of lectures, visual presentations and hopefully discussions. It will appeal to those who have curiosity and interest in all aspects of space exploration.

INVESTIGATING NUMBERS (Brian Ford)

Ferndown Youth Centre, Tuesdays 9.30 - 10.45.

This course will appeal to people who have an interest in numbers and those who would like to find out how working with them can be enjoyable. It is not intended for people with advanced maths qualifications; a basic grounding in numeracy is all that is required and calculators may be used when necessary. The course is based on a variety of investigative puzzles involving numbers and for those who like a challenge, algebra.

Guidance will be given at the start of each session. Course members can then work on the investigation either on their own or with others. Each session will end with a discussion of the results. The course will not be rigid and members may suggest investigations or problems for the rest of the group to solve. The objective is that the sessions should be thought provoking, but more importantly FUN.

MAP AND COMPASS (June and Richard Buxton)

Indoors at Ferndown Youth Centre, Thursday 11.15 - 12.00.

- or outdoors all morning, meet at 9.15 a.m. in Ringwood car park

Learn how to read a map and use a compass - no prior knowledge required. It won't be all theory, when it's fine the group will be going outside, relating the map to what they see around them, walking around two miles. The course will be based on the OS Outdoor Leisure map 22 (New Forest) 1:25,000 scale. If you haven't got a copy, <u>don't</u> go out and buy one, or a compass for that matter.

UNDERSTANDING SCIENCE (Sheila Goode)

Ferndown Youth Centre, Thursday at 11.15 - 12.30.

This is a course for those who feel they missed out on science and would like to look at the basic principles and link those ideas to modern developments which are transforming our lives. Some simple demonstration experiments and no maths.

WRITERS

CREATIVE WRITING (Barbara Bateman)

Ferndown Youth Centre, Thursday 9.30-11.15 This group is for people who like to express their feelings through prose or poetry, or try their hand at creating characters, situations or stories. Members give each other lost of encouragement and help. Most writing is for our own pleasure and beginners are most welcome.

WRITERS' CIRCLE (George Lorimer)

Ferndown Youth Centre, Thursday 9.30-11.00

No formal lessons are given but an essay subject is chosen each week, but members may choose their own subject. Whilst not everyone will have an essay every week, those submitted are read aloud, stimulating discussion on writing and kindred subjects. Some have had work published, whilst others prefer to write purely for enjoyment.

CREATIVE WRITING CIRCLE (Colin Gregory)

Verwood United Reformed Church, Thursday 9.30-11.00 Fortnightly Starting 2nd October Come and develop and improve the skills of Creative Writing by exercise, practice and discussion, in a supportive atmosphere structured to encourage writers of all levels of experience.

MISCELLANEOUS

DRAMA WORKSHOP (Colin Culham)

Ferndown Youth Centre, Tuesdays 11.15 - 12.45.

This group deals almost entirely with improvisation - that is unscripted drama. The members of the group will be given unlimited scope to explore ideas, character, feelings, and to make full use of the imagination through the playing of drama games and the creation of improvised situations. This type of work will help, if necessary, to eliminate shyness, self-consciousness, diffidence, and help towards a fluency of communication. A drama workshop can be serious or lighthearted, depending on the mood of the moment. It should always be creative and enjoyable. It is not intended to be a traditional drama club where public performance is the main objective, but some time will be given to the Christmas entertainment.

HOLIDAY GROUP (Audrey Confrey)

Ferndown Youth Centre, Tuesdays 1.30 - 2.45.

This is a mainly social group which meets to discuss holidays and excursions and to share experiences. While it may be of interest to single members, it is hoped that people in partnerships will also be interested in joining. The pooling of ideas may lead to some group holidays being arranged

PASSPORT TO THE LAND OF WINE (Gerry Lewis)

Ferndown Youth Centre, Wednesday 1.30-2.45

This course allows members to obtain a comprehensive framework of information and guidance about the wines of the world. This all-consuming subject will be presented in an interesting and easy way, particularly for the beginner. We should all take the opportunity to sample the wide variety of good quality wines so readily available to us, both at home and on our holidays.

PHILOSOPHY WORKSHOP (Terry Baker)

Ferndown Youth Centre, Mondays 3.00 - 4.15.

We are a small group of people interested in contributing to discussions on philosophical matters. There is a short introductory talk lasting perhaps 20 minutes or so, and then the group as a whole considers and discusses that topic in some detail. No point of view is barred, but consideration and respect for others is a requirement.

IN ADDITION

SATURDAY SINGLES SOCIAL GROUP (Pat O'Riordan)

Primarily this is a group of members who, because they live alone, meet for a pub lunch the second Saturday in each month. In addition, arrangements are made to attend the theatre, ballet, cinema, etc. on an ad hoc basis.

PUB WALKS (Various leaders - volunteers please!) Last Friday each month A walk of four or five miles is organised, finishing at a pub for lunch. Watch the noticeboards for details.

VERWOOD LUNCHEON CLUB (Ron Bennett) Third Wednesday each month Members enjoy lunch together at various locations .
